As President of the Bengal Lancer Alumni Foundation, I am pleased to report that we have had a busy, productive year, and the Foundation is doing very well! I wanted to take a moment to highlight a few of our major accomplishments.

Thanks to your generous financial support, the Foundation funded \$2,500 scholarships for two deserving Lancer actives. With your continued support, the Foundation will fund these scholarships for the 2019-2020 academic year. This year, the Foundation will continue to make additional donations in support of Trinity's educational activities. In recognition of the Foundation's support, Trinity has named us a Business Affiliate. While these donations are coming from the Foundation's cash flow, the Board of Directors continues to add to the Foundation's permanent endowment, with the eventual goal of supporting our school and our club from investment income.

An important part of the Foundation's mission is to foster fellowship and brother-hood...to strengthen and temper the bonds of our fellowship. Our regional chapter leaders have done a great job of hosting local events for Lancer alumni. Lancer alumni in Dallas, Houston, and Austin have gathered for comedy performances by Bengal Lancer Josh Wolf. Lancers, Betas, and their families gathered in Houston for a crawfish boil. Other Lancer alumni have organized impromptu meet ups across the country. If you would like to organize a Lancer gathering in your community, please let me know. If you will be in San Antonio for Alumni Weekend, there will be several opportunities for you to reconnect with your Lancer brothers. (More on all of this elsewhere in this newsletter.)

Lancer Alumni have engaged with the Lancer Actives several times during the last year. In the spring, Alumni hosted an event for New Actives, getting to know the newest Lancers and quizzing them about our history and traditions. We hope to make this a regular part of Lancer New Active Orientation. This summer, the Actives asked the Foundation for help in creating a strategic plan to grow and diversify the club. Anderson, who welcomed the group and gave some inspirational remarks.

LANCER FOUNDATION FINANCIAL UPDATE

In the last six months, there has been a significant increase in the number of individual donations made, dollars received, and number of Life Members added to the rolls of the Bengal Lancer Alumni Foundation! Net assets at the end of August 2018 have increased to \$28,779.08 compared to \$14,297.89 at the end of 2017. To date in 2018, there have been 44 donations made (compared to 33 in all of 2017) and 10 new BLAF Life Members (compared to 7 new Life Members in all of 2017). BLAF has received \$21,870.00 through donations and proceeds from local chapter events.

The Foundation has also contributed \$3,250.00 to Trinity University and MD Anderson (in memory of Chip Bonner) so far and has committed to funding the two scholarships for the actives again for an additional \$5,000.00 in donations to Trinity University. We also donated \$500 to the PAWS organization (Parent and Alumni with Spirit) to support the activities around Trinity Athletics.

While the donations received have allowed the Foundation to initiate and maintain these scholarships to date, we still have ground to cover to achieve the goal of creating endowed scholarships and long term support for the Bengal Lancer actives and the University.

THE ORIGIN OF THE BENGAL LANCERS

The Great Depression of the early 1930's was hard on Trinity University. Delivering a second blow, cotton prices collapsed. These two economic catastrophes hit Trinity especially hard. Many families could not afford the "luxury" of sending their children to college. Those that could, often struggled to stay current with their tuition payments. Enrollment dropped, and with the loss of students, there was a loss of revenue. The school struggled to meet its financial obligations. To make ends meet, the board of regents dipped into the university's small endowment. Teachers abandoned the school after being asked to "voluntarily" contribute a portion of their salaries back to the endowment. The university granted payment extensions and waivers to hard-pressed students, but it was not uncommon for students to go home for a visit, then never return to Waxahachie, Enrollment dropped to just 209 students.

In 1934, Trinity President John Burma tendered his resignation, declaring that he was tired of being a "beggar" forced to "live out of a suitcase." To make matters worse, the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools placed Trinity's accreditation status on probation. Trinity was on the verge of collapse.

To succeed President Burma, Trinity's Board of Regents appointed Raymond Hotchkiss Leach. President Leach would be taking office facing almost insurmountable obstacles. Declining enrollment. The loss of faculty. Finances in shambles. President Leach's failure would mean the end of Trinity University.

In an unusual move, President Leach spent several months in Waxahachie, visiting the campus *incognito*. He mixed and mingled with administrators, faculty, and students. Everyone assumed that he was a school supply salesman, a potential faculty member, or a school inspector. He asked everyone he met to tell him about the school and to describe its problems. The subterfuge worked: everyone unloaded on him. He quickly learned the frustrations, fears, and problems faced by the university. He also identified potential leaders.

In one of his first moves, President Leach turned his attention to the declining student enrollment, particularly the university's inability to retain freshmen. Many arrived over the Sum-

mer, then left the campus before classes began in the Fall. President Leach recognized the need to



quickly bring the freshmen together into a cohesive group. He needed to find a way to make them become "Trinity Tigers." He called a meeting with the student leaders he had identified in his undercover investigation.

President Leach called on three freshmen, Fred Dickson, Mac Satterfield, and Joe Wood, to form a new campus organization, charged with bringing

the freshmen class together. Mac was the Freshman Class President. Joe was his Vice-President. Fred was one of Trinity's star athletes and was one of the most popular men on campus. The purpose of the organization was, "...to keep the Tiger Spirit an omnipresent and active reality on campus and to make this spirit a never-failing shadow of the Tiger Team." President Leach gave the three young men permission to "haze" the freshmen in order to bring them closer together... not an uncommon practice at northeastern and Ivy League colleges of the day.

The first order of business for Fred, Mac, and Joe was to come up with a name for their new club. They toyed with using something based on the Trinity Tiger mascot...specifically, the Bengal Tiger from India. As it happened, one of the top movies of the day was an adventure story, based on a book by F. Yeats Brown, which told the story of three British cavalry soldiers fighting in northwest India in the early 19th century. In the movie, Lieutenant Alan McGregor, played by Gary Cooper in his first major role, was in charge of newcomers to the unit. He welcomed two new soldiers to the 41st Bengal Lancers, Lieutenant John Forsythe and Lieutenant Donald Stone. Stone happened to be the privileged son of the unit's commander.

Forsythe was an ordinary, workingclass soldier. The three men came from very different backgrounds, but the rigors of war brought them together, teaching them to overcome their differences and to pledge their lives to supporting their comrades...



the Bengal Lancers. This was the inspiration Fred, Mac, and Joe needed, and Trinity's Bengal Lancers were born.

One scene in the movie left a big impression on the three freshmen: The three Lancer heroes are captured by a ruthless Indian warlord, who tells them, "we have ways of making men talk." He then casually orders the Lancers to be tortured by having their fingernails torn off. Despite their agony, the two older Lancers refuse to talk. The younger Lancer cracks and reveals what he knows about his fellow soldiers. As a result, the remaining Lancers are attacked and defeated. From this example came the Lancer tradition of secrecy. Better that one Lancer endure agony and temptation than for his brothers to be betrayed by his weakness.

The Bengal Lancers grew out of necessity in the dark days of the Great Depression as the brainchild of Trinity's then-President, Raymond Leach. The organization helped unify the student body at a time when Trinity's future was anything but bright. As the club grew in prominence, the student body became more cohesive...finally becoming "Trinity Tigers." Enrollment stabilized and the university gained a strong financial footing. President Leach's plan worked, and the club he inspired is one of the reasons Trinity exists today.

VINTAGE JERSEYS RECREATED!

As many of you know, around 1989 our long-time supplier of Lancer jerseys went out of business. With it went the only source of the vintage style jersey that many of us know and love that has the red, white, and blue colors associated with it. Practically every Lancer from 1989 onwards did not have the traditional style jersey. The club did make due with jerseys that were every bit as "red" as the older style. However, some Alumni have never stopped looking to bring back the old style. Fast forward to 2018 and Matt Shatzkin (Sp. '89) has done the yeoman's work of finding a vendor that can almost exactly custom create the beloved jersey style, pictured below.

The Lancer Foundation will be providing all of the Active Lancers with their own vintage style jersey with their names sewn on the back during Alumni Weekend this year. The first jersey created was in honor of the late Spencer Street (Sp. '86), and it will be presented to his widow Joni Street.


LANCER ACTIVE-ALUMNI LEADERSHIP RETREAT HELD TO DEFINE LONG TERM GOALS, STRENGTHN RELATIONSHIPS

This past July, Leadership from the Lancer Fraternity and the Lancer Foundation met at the home of John Mace (Fall '68) for the annual Active-Alumni Leadership retreat. Lancers across 50 years gathered to share ideas, develop plans for the future, identify areas of change, and most importantly build relationships and temper the bonds of the Fraternity and the Foundation.

Unlike in year's past, this year included a series of focused working sessions to lay out a formal set of long-term goals that were formally ratified by both the Foundation Board and the Fraternity among their respective members.

The event was kicked off by Trinity University President Danny Anderson, and frankly this may have been the first time the President of the University has addressed the Lancers directly since the founding of the club. We were honored to have President Anderson in attendance and his words of encouragement meant a





below.

During the working session, attendees were also asked to post on a board what they defined a Bengal Lancer to be. Input came from both Actives and Alumni. There was a remarkable commonality in response, verifying that the shared values we all cherish are very much alive and well today, and at the core of the Lancer traditions.

The retreat by all accounts was a success, and put in place an important foundation to build on in the coming years.

The participants broke up into four different work groups to tackle some tough challenges facing the Fraternity. The teams settled along four major themes: **Diversity**, **Growth**, **Respect** and **Leadership**. Each group developed a 3 year plan with measurable milestones for improvement and to track progress over time. As a result of these sessions 4 key goals were agreed that the participants felt would strengthen the Bengal Lancer Fraternity and make it an important part of the Trinity University community. Those goals are shown



Common values identified among Actives and Alumni during the Retreat

Bengal Lancer 3 Year Goals

- 1. <u>Improve Diversity</u>: Increase the diversity of the Fraternity to source members outside of traditional channels (i.e. the Football team).
- Grow and Maintain Scale: Grow the Bengal Lancer Fraternity to an average of 25 Actives or greater by 2021
- Be Leaders: Be recognized as leaders on campus and have a high level of significance to the University
- 4. <u>Be Respected</u>: The Lancers should come to be viewed as ambassadors of the University AND the Fraternity of choice among the Greek community

LANCER FOUNDATION INTRODUCES CHALLENGE COINS FOR THOSE GOING ABOVE AND BEYOND IN SERVICE TO B/L, AND EACH OTHER

In recent years, Challenge Coins have become a popular way for organizations to promote themselves. The practice started with military units. In fact, the practice goes back to the Roman Empire. Roman generals commissioned coins bearing their likeness on one side and a regimental emblem on the other. They were presented to soldiers who distinguished themselves in battle.

The tradition continued through the Middle Ages. European noblemen used coins as gifts. They soon became a way for people to demonstrate their loyalty to one house or another.

During World War I, challenge coins were used to identify friendly forces. Legend has it that a wealthy American volunteer, fighting for the French before the United States formally entered the war, presented challenge coins to his squadron mates. He kept his personal coin in a leather bag which he wore around his neck. During one battle, his fighter plane was shot down behind enemy lines. He was captured by the Germans and stripped of his uniform and identification. Somehow, he managed to hang onto his coin. As fighting raged around him, he managed to escape and sneak back across enemy lines. He made his way to a French battalion, but without identification he was presumed to be a spy. The French were prepared to execute him on the spot. Luckily, he still had his coin. One of the French soldiers recognized the squadron insignia on the back and convinced the firing squad to wait until he could confirm the man's identity. When they learned that he was actually an ally, they apologized and gave him a bottle of wine.

The airman's use of his "challenge coin" to prove his identity, with a drink as a reward, became a military tradition. Now, when soldiers encounter one another, one soldier will produce a challenge coin, and slam it on the bar. If another soldier cannot produce his coin in response, he is expected to buy the first soldier a drink. On the other hand, if the challenged soldier produces a coin, the first soldier must buy him a drink.

During World War II, challenge coins were used as covert identification for "Wild Bill" Donovan's spies in the Office of Strategic Service...predecessor to the C.I.A. Working behind enemy lines, they could not have anything identifying them as military men. Instead, they carried what was otherwise an ordinary coin in the local currency. When two or more spies met up, they would ask for some change. Only they knew to look for a specific type of coin, with a specific date and denomination. Producing the proper coin identified its holder as a friend.

Bengal Lancers have been exchanging "challenge coins" for decades...we just didn't call them that. You may recall being given a shiny new dime by your Big Brother at the beginning of orientation. Lancer tradition holds that the dime is to be used only to call your big brother if you decide to quit. Holding onto your pledge dime is a sign of determination, strength, and perseverance.

The Bengal Lancer Alumni Foundation has begun a new tradition, with the minting of the first alumni challenge

coin. On one side of the burnished bronze coin is the seal of the Foundation...our letters B and L separated by a lance tip, surrounded by the name of the foundation. On the reverse is the regimental sigil of England's Royal Bengal Lancers...the inspirational namesake of our club. The Lancers' skull-and-crossed-bones "Death's Head" supports a banner bearing the inscription "Or Glory" arrayed before two crossed lances with red and white pennants. Surrounding the Lancer Death's Head is our club's Latin motto: "Ductus, Fraternitas, Servitum," or Leadership, Brotherhood, Service.

These coins cannot be purchased...they must be given. The first Challenge Coin was given to John I. Mace, in recognition of his lifetime of service to our organization. The second coin was given to Trinity President Danny J. Anderson, in honor of his support and respect. Other coins have been given to people who have demonstrated exemplary commitment to the Bengal Lancers, such as through service on the Foundation's Board of Directors, as an Alumni Advisor to the club, or as a Life Member of the Foundation.

The coins may only be given in person, hand-to-hand. Recipients may keep their coins...or pass them on to someone who has demonstrated extraordinary service or sacrifice in support of the Bengal Lancers. If you encounter someone who possesses a Lancer Alumni Challenge coin, you should acknowledge that you are in the presence of a person

who has gone above and beyond for our club, demonstrating the true meaning of B/L. It is suggested that you take a moment to strengthen and temper the bonds of your fellowship with this person, and honor them with a drink and a handshake.



GREAT MEMORY: LAN-CERS RALLY AROUND INJURED BROTHER

In November 1971 the Lancers were playing the Thetas in flag football. I was lineman that night playing next to John Mace. We had a formidable line that year. During a play I believe John Mace blocked a Theta and knocked him down and he landed on my leg. I sustained a torn medial collateral ligament in my left knee. While at the emergency room I found out that my parents neglected to tell me I no longer had health insurance. I had to go to an orthopedic surgeon



and was told I needed surgery. I remember going back to Trinity and the

Lancers were practicing as I came up on my crutches. Jim Pillsbury came up to me and I started crying because I did not know how I was going to pay for the surgery. I had the surgery a few days later thinking I was going to go on a payment plan to pay for it. After the surgery, I was released from the hospital and I was in my apartment when Knox Gilmore came up and presented me with a check of over \$7,000 to cover the cost of the surgery. He said the Lancers rallied around a money raising effort to help me out. They had a car wash and got the University behind them along with donations from Lancer alums. I was shocked at the gesture and have always been so grateful to my Lancer brothers. I feel the sense of giving and rallying around causes is something the Lancers will always be known for. I still cannot thank the Lancers enough for what they did for me.


